1:00 p.m. – Business Meeting.


1:20 p.m. – Break.

Kisatchie Native Plant Rescue

During a recent project on the Kisatchie National Forest (KNF), more than 300 plants native to Louisiana were recovered from lands scheduled for clearing as part of the U.S. Highway 167 Expansion/Improvement project. Fifteen volunteers representing seven organizations participated in the all-day effort to dig up native forbs and woody plants. The plants are destined for wildlife refuges, native plant gardens, and the use of individuals interested in native plant landscaping.

On December 2, the group visited five sites of rescue north of Williana and south of Packton, along Highway 167, on the KNF's Catahoula Ranger District. This highway corridor is scheduled for timber clearing and grading in preparation for an additional two lanes of highway adjacent to the current highway. The predominant habitat types visited for rescue included mesic hardwood slope

forest and small streams. Popular plant species collected included: paw paw, Christmas fern, American holly, witch hazel, cranefly orchid, grapefern, and bigleaf magnolia.

Dr. Charles Allen, botanist/ecologist with the Fort Polk military reservation, scouted out the rescue sites, and organized the event. Peter Nilles, KNF forest botanist, assisted Dr. Allen by securing collection permits and overseeing safety at the staging areas. A number of organizations were represented, including Fort Polk, KNF, the Louisiana Native Plant Society, Red River Refuge, CENLA Audubon, and the NSU herbarium.

The event was productive and safe for all involved. A special note of thanks goes out to Dr. Allen for his organizational efforts.
